to come together to watch and pray.  
If we keep the memorial  
of the Lord's paschal solemnity in this way,  
listening to his Word and celebrating His mysteries,  
then we shall have the sure hope  
of sharing His triumph over death  
and living with Him in God.

May the light of Christ, rising in glory,  
dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds.  
May the flame be found still burning by the Morning Star, the one Morning Star who never sets,  
Christ your Son, who, coming back from death's domain,  
has shed his peaceful light on humanity.  
and lives and reigns for ever and ever.

The family could sing *This Little Light of Mine*, or an *Hallelujah Song*. Something to celebrate Jesus. They could also make a procession around the home with the candle, blessing it and singing praise (obviously make sure you are safe if you're doing this.) Obviously the candles should not be left burning overnight, but parents can blow it out and relight in the morning so children are reminded of Jesus' Resurrection as soon as they wake up in the morning, not just the bunny. The prayers above are ones that are actually used during the Easter Vigil Mass so families will be praying with the rest of the world. Participate in live-stream Mass if kids can stay up that late.
