*A while ago I got sick.
It was a thorough and major sick.
Lost use of the old hands and feet,
Which was, as you can imagine, weird.
My kids called the sickness The Thing.
The Thing went on for months and months.
I could tell you lots of stories about The Thing.
But there's only one story that I want to tell you:
Every morning my son got up early to help me
Put my socks on. I would sit on the back stairs

The relationship between a father and his daughter or son is sacred. Recall all of the times when you were little when your Dad was right there to take care of you, to encourage you, and to just love you no matter what.

It is an honor for you and me to take care of a father (or a mother!) as he or she ages. Being such a go-getter and so independent, it was hard for my Dad to deal with those diminishment that accompany illness and ageing.

My Dad loved the outdoors and, towards the end of his life, he enjoyed taking a walk in his wheelchair, so to speak. I enjoyed pushing him around the neighborhood. He found it hard sometimes to receive help, especially with all things having to do with hygiene.

My Dad was a perfectionist, for sure. As a consummate homebuilder, he never cut corners or did anything haphazardly or sloppily. His work was always a labor of love. I try to measure up to my Dad's example!

Pope Francis had a beautiful understanding of the greatness of Saint Joseph, the husband of Mary and the stepfather of Jesus. The late Holy Father was installed as the new Pope on the Solemn Feast of Saint Joseph on March 19, 2013. I remember his inaugural homily well without even having to look it up. However, down below, you will see that I did look the homily up because I wanted to quote Francis directly!

What I remember is that Francis called attention to Saint Joseph as a Protector. He protected his family. He protected the example of Jesus by imitating Jesus. He had a love for creation and understood how our Earth, our common home, is crying out for our tender stewardship. We do not have dominion over the earth but rather we are the earth's caretakers. We still may have to do that better!

Pope Francis reminded us that Saint Joseph was a tender man. According to the Holy Father, we need a new revolution of tenderness in all our relationships. Being tender is not a sign of weakness.

Francis suggested "Saint Joseph appears as a strong and courageous man, a working man, yet in his heart we see great tenderness, which is not the virtue of the weak but rather a sign of strength of spirit and a capacity for concern, for compassion, for genuine openness to others, for love. We must not be afraid of goodness, of tenderness."
