### Parish Landscaping Taskforce

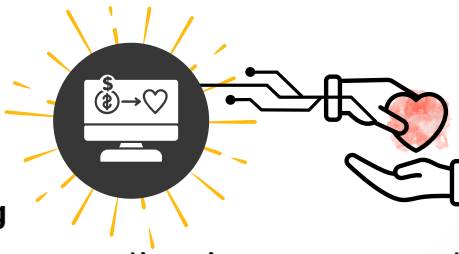

## Faith Direct is becoming ParishSOFT Giving

On October 7, 2025 Faith Direct will be upgrading its system and rebranding as ParishSOFT Giving. For the most part your experience of the system will be the same. The first change you will see is that you will need to set a new password. Your username will be your email address. Once you enter that you will need to set up a new password.

One other change will be the language used in the system. In Faith Direct giving opportunities are called "Appeals". In ParishSOFT Giving they will be called "Funds".

A temporary web address for the upgraded system is <https://giving.parishsoft.com/app/giving/FD-990>. This will be available on October 7th but not before that. We will be able to simplify the web address after October 7th but we will announce that when it happens.

If you don't currently use Faith Direct, this will be an opportunity to consider giving to the parish electronically.

# in Joy & SORROW

WITH FR. BILL SWICHTENBERG



I was moved by Erika Kirk's genuine promise to forgive the alleged murderer of her husband. In her eulogy for Charlie at the Memorial State Farm Stadium in Glendale, AZ, on Sunday, September 21, Erika recalled Jesus' transforming words spoken from His Cross, "Father, forgive them, they know what they do." (Luke 23:34) This gesture is not something Erika was able to make on her own but only with the holy grace of Jesus' Spirit of Forgiveness. It was Alexander Pope (1711) who said in a poem, "To err is human; to forgive is divine."

Forgiveness is not natural to us human beings. We need the grace of the Lord overflowing into our hearts to be able to forgive those who have wronged us or hurt us. There is no timetable for the granting of this forgiveness. For some of us, it may take a long time to come to that place.

I remind you, too, that forgiveness does not mean forgetting. We forgive but will always remember the pain unjustly inflicted upon us, but with a peace and calm rather than an obsession with anger or retaliation.

Forgiveness is not an act of exoneration. The consequences of a violent action still remain and sometimes result in imprisonment. I would say, too, that imprisonment without the possibility of parole is sufficient punishment. The death penalty only furthers more violence. Pope Francis was clear in revising the Catechism of the Catholic Church, in October 2018, to read in paragraph 2267, on the death penalty:

Recourse to the death penalty on the part of legitimate authority, following a fair trial, was long considered an appropriate response to the gravity of certain crimes and an acceptable, albeit extreme, means of safeguarding the common good.

Today, however, there is an increasing awareness that the dignity of the person is not lost even after the commission of very serious crimes. In addition, a new understanding has emerged of the significance of penal sanctions imposed by the state. Lastly, more effective systems of detention have been developed, which ensure the due protection of citizens but, at the same time, do not definitively deprive the guilty of the possibility of redemption.

Consequently, the Church teaches, in the light of the Gospel, that “the death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person”, and [the Church] works with determination for its abolition worldwide.

Sadly, there exists a strong pushback against this teaching by conservative Christians, including Catholics. They endorse the “eye for an eye” mentality of the Hebrew Scriptures (Exodus 21:23) while ignoring Jesus’ declarations of “I desire mercy not sacrifice” (Matthew 9:13) and “When someone strikes you on your right cheek, turn the other one to him (her) as well” (Sermon on the Mount, Matthew 5:39). Pro-life Christians who are pro-death penalty are being ethically inconsistent.

Forgiveness is all about letting go. Sometimes the one who has hurt us cannot bring himself or herself to say “I am sorry” or is unable to receive the gift of our forgiveness. No matter, because forgiveness is also for the one who offers it. It can release a torrent of healing in my heart, where anger is replaced by peace and calm.

I am reminded of the Great Madiba of South Africa, Nelson Mandela, who was imprisoned on Robben Island for nearly 27 years because of his courageous speaking out against the sin of apartheid in the 1980s, when black people were discriminated against by the ruling white people. On the day of his release, as the Great Madiba walked under the archway at the prison’s entrance, he announced, “If I do not forgive my captors, I will remain here in prison!”

Perhaps you remember the great Saint Pope John Paul II, who survived an assassination attempt against him on May 13, 1981, in Saint Peter’s Square, Rome. The cover of Time Magazine on January 9, 1984, was a photograph of the Holy Father, seated on a folding chair in a visitors’ room in the prison, across from the man who attempted to take his life. This saint came to forgive his convicted assassin.

Finally, I am reminded of one of my mentors, Cardinal Joseph Bernardin, the Archbishop of Chicago, who was falsely accused of sexual abuse by Steven Cook, when Steven was a student in the seminary in Cincinnati, where the Cardinal was the rector. This was a horrible and humiliating time in the life of Bernardin, standing in front of TV cameras and flashing lightbulbs, vehemently denying the allegations. During the Christmas holidays in 1993, the Cardinal flew out to Philadelphia so that he could forgive Mr Cook for the cross the young man had forced the Cardinal to carry. The Cardinal graciously accepted Mr Cook's apology.

This humble and faithful servant of the Church said to Steven: "In every family, there are times when there is hurt, anger and alienation. But we cannot run away from our family (adding here that the Church is our spiritual family). We have only one family, so we must make every effort to be reconciled."

Truly all people of grace who bestowed the grace of forgiveness on another human being and upon themselves: : Erika Kirk of Phoenix, President Nelson Mandela of South Africa, Saint Pope John Paul II of Rome, and Cardinal Joseph Bernardin of Chicago!

All for the glory of God!
