Last Sunday (2/22), Ms Kirsty Coventry, President of the International Olympic Committee, formally declared that the 25th Winter Olympic Games in Milan, Italy, closed. I always experience a moment of sadness at the Closing Ceremony of any Olympic Game. The beauty of a worldwide gathering of young athletes, and maybe a few not so young, so inspiring are the diversity among them, the vibrancy, the hope, the character of a team which declares that *together everyone achieves more joy* and the excellency that drives each athlete to perform to the best of her or his ability. It is true that only one in 500,000 Americans will ever receive the coveted Olympic medal. The discipline and deprivation necessary to achieve that goal is beyond what you and I can even begin to imagine.

There is a Greek word for strenuous athletic training involving discipline and deprivation. It is *askesis*. Our word *ascetic*

comes from the Greek, and conjures up the image of a monk or nun sequestered for most of the day in his or her room in the monastery. This cell is not a prison cell because the door is not locked but I am guessing this asceticism may sometimes feel like a prison. One is forced to confront one's shadow side. One is forced to embrace discipline and deprivation.

In the early Church, men and women chose to live in the desert to get away from all worldly distractions.

Lisa Colon DeLay, of The Center for Contemplation and Action, writes:

“These desert dwellers were athletes, training not for sports or games but for the spiritual contests of life: challenges that involved the totality of themselves. They purged their lives of everything superfluous and turned toward obtaining spiritual victories, which don't come easily....”

“Those with a passing knowledge of the desert ascetics may suppose they were ... pious followers of strict religious rules who had purged themselves of all fleshly desire and pleasure. That is incorrect.”

“While it's true that desert hermits and monastics had lives far removed from what we experience in a typical day, the human vulnerabilities that plagued them plague us too. The real test of spiritual maturity isn't whether it works on an isolated mountaintop cabin or a refreshing retreat center; it's whether we have been transformed so that our maturity plays out in regular life. Untold numbers of Christians, most of whom remain forgotten by history, found stillness and peace right in the middle of the stress and chaos of ordinary life, and many still do...”

“All the desert abbas and ammas [fathers and mothers] show us that one-off special insights are not what bring us spiritual maturity or peace. Through the layering of situations, struggles, and seasons, we grow more devoted, mature, and wise. The inheritance in the kingdom of heaven means possessing Christlikeness; this inheritance comes in slow disbursements that take diligence and attention to learn and receive. We accomplish this not over weeks or months but over decades—over our lifetime and even into and throughout generations. The place is slow. Let's get accustomed to that and settle in for the long haul.”

Here are the laudable traits in the spiritual life: becoming Jesus-like, devotion, maturity, wisdom, diligence, and an attention to learn and receive.

I would treasure a conversation with the 21-year-old US figure skater, Ilia Malinin. We all know his story in Milan. Designated the *Quadgod* and named to be the certain winner of the individual gold medal far ahead of the events in Milan, in his free skate, fell to

the ice three times, if my memory serves me well (which by the way, it sometimes doesn't). His performance was devastatingly crushing for him and shocking for his fans. Ilia had not lost a skating competition in the last three years!

These experiences in Milan have changed this young man, and I believe he will be more mature and wiser, more attentive to learn and receive, as he moves forward in figure skating. Though it may take some time, one day he will look back and see his failed performance at the 25th Winter Olympic Games as a beautiful gift.

The Washington Post (2/19) reported so much as already changed for Ilia, who finished in 8th place in the free figure skating. Ilia himself stated, "The person who came [to the Olympics], he's been turned to dust. [On Ash Wednesday, we were reminded that we are all dust.] I came out a different person, with a different perspective."

Ilia reported that the change came over him almost immediately as he went over to hug the gold medalist, Mikhail Shaidorov of Kazakhstan.

Ilia admitted that "but in the end, life is not fair. It's not going to give you everything you want." He talked about the importance of keeping a positive mind. "I've made an impact...It's simply because I put myself out there and did what I always do [and that doesn't] mean I have to deliver a competition. It's simply being there and being myself."

This young man has found some peace. In the end, maybe this is the gold hidden and already beginning to shine brightly through him in the aftermath of his Olympic performance! Ilia has taught young people and all of us so much by his grace and gratitude!

Thanks, too, to Tom Brady, Super Bowl Champion seven times, and Simone Biles, Olympic medalist in women's gymnastics, whose experiences in sports carry a lot of wisdom, for reaching out to Ilia with their love and support!

Finally, here is the link to Ilia's Gala skate last Saturday night in Milan. For him, it was therapeutic, I think. For us, it was a masterpiece!
